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ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

Global pandemics have created high uncertainty across economies. The world is slowly emerging from the recession, but the much-discussed "better recovery" remains uncertain. In all economies, recurring outbreaks have a detrimental effect on growth prospects. Unlike conventional anticipations of broad-based recovery and growth, the recovery paths of Asian economies are divergent. There is no doubt that the ongoing pandemic will have an indelible impact on micro, small and medium-sized businesses (MSMEs), the energy sector, agriculture, and food security, the tourism sector, as well as cross-border trade, as it has caused disruptions in a variety of scales and forms across countries. Additionally, these areas can accelerate resiliency and drive economic growth if well-designed and implemented policies aimed at sustained growth. A major focus of the conference will be the discussion of these and other pertaining questions.

Uncertainty is a hot topic in discussions on sustainability and development—whether in financial systems, climate, migration, disease, or infrastructure. Decision-makers often treat all kinds of uncertainties as if they are risks, with probabilities that can be calculated. But sustainability involves other kinds of uncertainties — whether they are due to incomplete evidence, complexity, divergent values, scientific disagreement, gaps in knowledge, or the simple possibility of surprise. Uncertainties can make it hard to plan. But recognizing them can help to reveal new questions and choices. Through a series of events and learning activities linked to research, in 2023 the Department of Economics, Central University of Rajasthan is exploring responses, methods, and actions to open up new pathways to sustainability in an uncertain world.

The conventional approach in managerial and technocratic thinking is to construct challenges as risks, thereby estimating or knowing the probabilities of future outcomes. Many familiar tools are used in risk assessment and management, derived from engineering principles. The approach is useful when designing a bridge or road, but not when studying complex socio-ecological dynamics. Taking risks in uncertain situations or an environment of ignorance can be extremely risky. We cannot often face our uncertain world because our institutions and policies are built on a risk-based approach. With a risk-focused view, we can control the future with effective research and technocratic control. However, accepting uncertainty implies an alternative perspective on the urgent issues of sustainability and development, where a more cautious, adaptable, and improvisational approach becomes crucial.

- The accepted language would be preferably English in MS Word, Times New Roman with 12 point font.
- The name, current affiliation, and working email address of all author(s)/contributors must be mentioned.
- The conference theme under which the abstract falls should also be mentioned.
- The abstract should be mailed as an attachment to iceco grs2023@curaj.ac.in on or before March 10, 2023.
- We are also accepting the online mode of presentation on the request of international delegates.

Publication

All the selected/presented papers at the international conference will be published in an edited volume with a reputed publisher and ISBN number. The title and the publisher will be announced later to the participants.

Formatting

- Structure: The manuscript should be in order as Cover page (title, abstract, keywords and name and affiliation of the author(s). With a new page: title, abstract, keywords, introduction, the significance of the study, material and method, results and findings, discussions, conclusion, acknowledgments, funding details, declaration of interest, references, appendix, table/figures (as required).
- The main body of the manuscript should be in Times New Roman with font size 12, with 1.5 line spacing and the footnotes in Times New Roman font size 10, with 1.5 line spacing.
- The manuscript must not be more than 8000 words, including abstract, keywords, table, figures, and images (except bibliography).
- US or UK English spelling should be consistently used.
- References should follow: Author(s) must strictly follow APA 7th edition reference style, All bibliographic entries must contain a corresponding in-text citation. References must be arranged in alphabetical order.
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
